ANNUAL MEETING 2019-2020

Our 2019-2020 Annual Meeting was held on Wednesday, August 19, 2021, at 8:00 a.m., virtually on Zoom. Accomplishments were shared and needs were discussed. Also, goals for the future were discussed including building capacity among key stakeholders, utilizing the Strategic Prevention Framework, and reducing youth alcohol and drug use as evidenced by the Illinois Youth Survey.

PROGRAMS/EVENTS

LOVE THY NEIGHBOR: August 29, 2020 - MCDAC staff teamed up with the Love Thy Neighbor ministry to provide a fun morning to youth in Joppa. Food and games were provided by the ministry and Holly and Stacie set up a table with drug prevention information along with the button-maker.

WEEKEND BLESSINGS: November 2020-May 2021 – As a way to distribute information to the community during the pandemic, MCDAC collaborated with the Weekend Blessings program to provide a drug prevention flyer each month that is included in the food bags. Around 175 bags are delivered every 2 weeks. We thank Sharon Burrus for allowing MCDAC to be involved in the program.

COPE FOOD PANTRY: February 2021-present – MCDAC also provides a flyer each month to COPE Food Pantry to provide in their food bags. In addition, they also offer the Deterra Drug Disposal bags for anyone in the community who needs to dispose of unwanted prescription drugs. We thank Steve and Toni Miller for initiating the collaboration for this project and for delivering the flyers to the food pantry each month.

PROGRAMS/EVENTS

RIDES TO RECOVERY: Ongoing – MCDAC was able to provide _____ rides over the past year. This is a very important program because of the very few treatment facilities that are located in our area. We do not want transportation to be the deciding factor on whether someone receives treatment for their addiction. Thanks to Steve Johnson for coordinating this program and also providing some of the rides. Also, thanks to Steve and Toni Miller for providing rides this year. We also want to thank everyone who is on the call list when a ride is needed.

TALK. THEY HEAR YOU. CAMPAIGN: Ongoing – We used the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) underage drinking campaign, Talk. They Hear You. for our billboard that was up from February-July. We also used the campaign on social media. The campaign encourages parents to talk to their children about drug and alcohol use.



NATIONAL RECOVERY MONTH: September 2020 – We kicked off National Recovery Month on August 31 with recognizing National Overdose Awareness Day on social media. Our Health Sector Representative, Clarissa Shepherd, also asked the City of Metropolis to declare a proclamation declaring that August 31 was National Overdose Day. For Recovery Month, Project Coordinator Stacie Aycock obtained recovery stories and pictures and posted them to our Facebook account.

CIVIC GROUPS: September & October 2020 – Program Director Holly Windhorst spoke at both the Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs about MCDAC updates and our Drug-Free Communities grant.

RED RIBBON WEEK: October 26-20, 2020 – The theme for Red Ribbon Week this year was "Be Happy. Be Brave. Be Drug-Free." MCDAC provided teacher kits to all K-6 teachers within the Massac and Joppa school districts. Each day had a drug-free message and item for each student. We also provided vaping prevention banners to Massac County High School, Massac Junior High, and Joppa Jr./Sr. High. We thank both the Massac and Joppa school districts for their help with Red Ribbon Week. PROGRAMS/EVENTS

DRUG DISPOSAL BAGS: January 2021-present – MCDAC Project Coordinator Stacie Aycock was able to secure 6,000 Deterra Drug Deactivation Bags through the RX Abuse Leadership Initiative (RALI). We plan to distribute these bags to anyone in the community who needs to dispose of old prescription medications for free. We thank our partners who have made the bags available at their business/organization: Metropolis Drugs I, Metropolis Drugs II, Massac County Mental Health, Massac County Sheriff's Department, Metropolis Police Department, Southern 7 Health Department, the Massac Memorial Hospital clinics, and COPE Food Pantry. We also thank the Metropolis Police Department for allowing us to have the bags delivered to the station. Further, we thank volunteers Steve & Toni Miller, Cindy Davis, Cami Horman, Addison Aycock, and Hayden DeJarnett for donating your time to apply MCDAC stickers to each of the bags. **WEBSITE:** March 2021 – present – MCDAC debuted a new website in March. NATIONAL ALCOHOL & DRUGS FACTS WEEK: March 22-26, 2021 – MCDAC joined the National Institute on Drug Abuse to participate in National Alcohol and Drug Facts Week. Our campaign was aimed at teens on social media, specifically Instagram. Each day, a fact or statistic about drugs was shared. Thanks to Youth Advisory Council member Alexis Frazine for creating all the graphics and posting them each day on our Instagram account (@mcdacyac).

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH: April 2021 – MCDAC is a part of the Massac County Child Abuse Prevention Coalition (a smaller group within the Southern 7 Child Abuse Prevention Coalition). The coalition planned a media event where the Governor's proclamation was read declaring April as Child Abuse Prevention month, along with providing information about preventing child abuse. Other events during the month were the Metropolis Police Department's digital message board displaying a prevention message, and Frosted by Mollie's bakery "going blue" with blue baked goods and providing child abuse prevention flyers. Massac Memorial Hospital also stuck signs up around Metropolis reminding citizens that it was Child Abuse Prevention month. We thank Massac County State's Attorney Josh Stratemeyer, Massac County Mental Health Director Tina Martin, and Holly Windhorst for speaking at the media event. We also thank Stacie Aycock and Rollie Hawk from Arrowleaf for live-streaming the event. Also, thanks to the Metropolis Police Department, Frosted by Mollie and Massac Memorial for helping get the prevention message out into the community. Lastly, we want to thank Brittney Hale and Amber Anderson from Prevent Child Abuse Illinois for spearheading the coalition meetings and helping us prepare for the events.

NATIONAL PREVENTION WEEK: May 10-14, 2021 – MCDAC participated in SAMHSA's National Prevention Week again this year by doing another social media campaign. The campaign was both on Facebook and Instagram. Each day, one of our partners' picture was posted and we talked about how they are preventing youth substance use and suicide in Massac County. Thanks to our participating partners: Massac County Sheriff's Department, Metropolis Drugs I, Metropolis Drugs II, Metropolis Police Department, Weekend Blessings, COPE Food Pantry, Centerpoint Recovery Outreach Team, Southern 7 Health Department, Dr. Johnathan Walters (Massac Memorial Hospital), and Massac County Mental Health.

PROJECT GRADUATION: May 14, 2021 – This year, MCDAC was able to purchase several door prizes to help with Project Graduation at Massac County High School.

Approximately 100 students attended this drug and alcohol-free event. Thank you to all the Senior parents who put this event together.

SHAWNEE COMMUNITY COLLEGE TRIO PROGRAM: May 2021 – MCDAC teamed up with the SCC Trio Program Director Jipaum Askew to provide prevention videos especially for youth in the TRIO program. The TRIO students have a special section on our website where they can view the videos. We thank Jipaum for her work on helping to make this happen.

HOPE UNLIMITED/HOUSING AUTHORITY BLOCK PARTY: June 17, 2021 – Several organizations from the community set up booths at the block party and served 330 people. MCDAC had a roulette game with prizes, and gave away buttons and other SWAG along with drug disposal bags and prevention information. Thanks to Robbin McDaniel from Massac Memorial Hospital, Lucy and Leo Windhorst, Program Director Holly Windhorst, and Janet Foster for helping with the MCDAC booth. YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Youth Advisory Council (YAC) from Massac County High School began meeting in February after almost a year-long hiatus due to COVID-19. The YAC met monthly for the remainder of the school year and worked on a couple of projects. In March, they used sidewalk chalk to write vaping, alcohol, and drug facts on the sidewalks leading up to the high school. The group also provided input on a social norms ad for the athletic fields at MCHS which will go up during the 2021-22 school year. The YAC also worked on a billboard which went up in July on Highway 45 in Metropolis. Some of the members are featured on the billboard. YAC member Alexis Frazine volunteered to run the MCDAC Instagram account this year and created graphics and posts each week for the account.

MEMBER TRAINING

- NATIONAL COALITION ACADEMY: Completed in 2020 Program Director Holly Windhorst and Project Coordinator Stacie Aycock were required to complete this training for the Drug-Free Communities grant. The training focused on community problem solving by using the Strategic Prevention Framework.
- COMMUNITY ANTI-DRUG COALITIONS OF AMERICA (CADCA) FORUM: February 1-4, 2021 – Program Director Holly Windhorst and Project Coordinator Stacie Aycock attended this leadership forum virtually. Included in the training was the

National Coalition Academy graduation, and also a virtual visit with Senator Dick Durbin to ask him to continue to support the Drug-Free Communities grant in Congress.

ILLINOIS CANNABIS FORUM: June 22-24, 2021 – Program Director Holly Windhorst and Project Coordinator Stacie Aycock attended this virtual training put on by Prevention First. The topics were how the legalization of marijuana in Illinois is affecting public safety, youth, and the community.

MCDAC IN THE NEWS

WPSD – MCDAC was featured in 2 stories on WPSD this past year: one regarding the marijuana dispensary and one regarding Child Abuse Prevention month.

WMOK – WMOK aired a story about MCDAC and our Drug Disposal Bag program.

GRANTS/FUNDRAISING

DRUG-FREE COMMUNITIES (DFC) GRANT: MCDAC was awarded a DFC grant beginning December 31, 2019. We have been awarded \$125,000 per year for 5 years with matching funds required. The initial award is for five years and then we will have an opportunity to apply for five more years.

GOLF SCRAMBLE FUNDRAISERS: October 9, 2020 & May 28, 2021 – MCDAC held two golf fundraisers this fiscal year due to 2020's being postponed due to COVID-19.
